

The Great War Trent to Trenches



A variety of original and replica objects, documents and information to illustrate life in Nottinghamshire during the Great War.

The resource contains additional information on the war and case studies of individuals of fought, including Nottingham Victoria Cross winner Albert Ball. All of the objects and information focus on the effects of the war on Nottinghamshire.

Also included is a timeline, book of suggested activities and an information card for each object.

These are all securely packed in conservation standard museum cases.

The resource contains the following objects

A set of campaign medals, newspapers, replica Victoria Cross. original trench map, flying helmet, entrenching tool, Empire Day certificates, horseshoe, brooch, standard issue New Testament, postcards, ration book, artillery shrapnel shell and white feather.



The resource can be used to meet the requirements of the national curriculum for **history** in the following areas of **subject content**:

- **KS1** Events beyond living memory that are significant nationally or globally Significant historical events, people and places in their own locality
- **KS2** A study of an aspect or theme in British history that extend pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066.

- **KS3** Challenges for Britain, Europe and the wider world: 1901 to the present day Local history study

The activity pack and supporting information contains activities and information that can be used to meet the requirements of the national curriculum for **English**, **art and design**, **geography** and **drama** at **KS1** to **3**.
